As we gear up for America's 250th birthday, there's no better time to dive into the stories that shaped our nation's beginning. In reflecting on the 250th anniversaries, we are reminded that the events which shaped our nation are uniquely American.



April 14, 1775 — Founding of the Pennsylvania Abolition Society

The Pennsylvania Abolition Society is considered the first organization in America—and one of the first in the world—dedicated to ending slavery.

Before abolition became a national cause, the Society advocated for emancipation.

This legacy of principled dissent is a powerful example of the uniquely American belief that all people deserve freedom.



April 18, 1775 — Paul Revere's Ride

Paul Revere warned the countryside that British troops moved to seize colonial arms in Concord, Massachusetts.

Not only acting in urgency, Revere's ride demonstrated an expression of selfgovernance and responsibility.

Paul Revere's ride captures the distinctly American spirit of citizens rising to protect their rights when need be.



April 19, 1775 — Battle of Lexington and Concord

The battle was not fought by a formal army; local farmers, tradesmen, and townspeople would be determined to defend their homes and liberties.

The shots fired that day—the "shot heard 'round the world"—launched a revolution rooted in freedom, self-governance, and the belief that Americans could shape their own destiny.
